that to promote fairness education should be meaningful for all individuals, open to differences and change, flexible in ideas with consistent and clear expectations for all.


that the teachers, students and parents are to be responsible for pursuing excellence and being accountable, thus making all we do worthy of pride.

What is Character.org?

Character.org is a nonprofit organization that strives to ensure young people everywhere are educated, inspired, and empowered to be ethical and engaged citizens.

Character.org focuses on defining and encouraging effective practices and approaches to quality character education and provides a forum for the exchange of ideas.

The 11 Principles of Effective Character Education

- The school community promotes core ethical and performance values as the foundation of good character.
- The school defines "character" comprehensively to include thinking, feeling, and doing.
- The school uses a comprehensive, intentional, and proactive approach to character development.
- The school creates a caring community.
- The school provides students with opportunities for moral action.
- The school offers a meaningful and challenging academic curriculum that respects all learners, develops their character, and helps them to succeed.

The 11 Principles of Effective Character Education

- The school fosters students' self-motivation.
- The school staff is an ethical learning community that shares responsibility for character education and adheres to the same core values that guide the students.
- The school fosters shared leadership and long-range support of the character education initiative.
- The school engages families and community members as partners in the character-building effort.
- The school regularly assesses its culture and climate, the functioning of its staff as character educators, and the extent to which its students manifest good character.

Becoming a National School of Character

- Process began June 2014 with data collection surveying our school community about the 11 principles of character
- Melissa Gorla, Beth VanBuren and Beth Lang presented at character.org's National Forum in October 2014, "Creating and Maintaining a Pillarific Community."
- Narrative application (with artifacts) completed December 2014
- State level review and visit January 2015
- Named a Pennsylvania State School of Character February 2015
- National Evaluation Visit March 2015
 - Day-long on-site
 - Student led tours
 - · Panel discussions with students, community, support staff and teachers
 - Interviews with administration and counselors

Next steps

- Skyview holds this distinction for 5 years
- Skyview will be recognized at the National Forum on Character in October 2015 and receive a banner for our school.
