TAKING ACTION

Checking a conscious victim

Interview the <u>victim</u> and bystanders.
Check the victim from <u>head</u> to toe.

CONDUCTING INTERVIEWS

- Start by asking the victim and bystanders simple <u>questions</u> to learn more about what happened.
- Keep interviews <u>brief</u>.
- Remember to always first <u>introduce</u> yourself and obtain consent to give care.

CONDUCTING INTERVIEWS

Proceed by asking the following questions:

- 1. What happened?
- 2. Do you feel pain or <u>discomfort</u> anywhere? Ask the victim to describe the pain and identify the location. Ask the victim to rate the pain on a scale of 1-10 (1 being mild, 10 being severe).
- 3. Do you have any <u>allergies</u>?
- 4. Do you have any medical conditions or are you taking any medications?

CONDUCTING INTERVIEWS

The victim may not be able to provide all of the necessary information.

- Infants or children may be frightened or the victim may speak another language.
- Remember to question family members, <u>friends</u>, and bystanders as well.
- Always <u>write</u> down the information you gather or have someone else write it down for you.

- Do not move areas in which they have <u>discomfort</u> or if you suspect head, neck, or back injury.
- Check for fluids, bleeding, or wounds.
- Check skin <u>color</u> and temperature. Look for ID bracelets and necklaces.
- Check for observable signs of pain.
- Watch for changes in consciousness and breathing.

STEPS TO FOLLOW:

- 1. Feel skin with back of your hand to determine temperature. Does it feel damp, dry, <u>cool</u>, or hot? Also, note if the skin color is red, pale, or ashen.
- 2. Ask the victim to move his or her head from side to side to check the neck.

STEPS TO FOLLOW:

- 3. Ask the victim to <u>shrug</u> his or her shoulders to check the shoulders.
- 4. Ask the victim breathe deeply and then blow out to check the chest and abdomen.
- 5. Ask the victim to move his or her <u>fingers</u>, hands, and arms.
- 6. Ask the victim to <u>bend</u> his or her legs.

STEPS TO FOLLOW:

- If there are no signs of serious injury, help the victim into a comfortable position.
- 8. Help the person slowly <u>stand</u> when he or she is ready.
